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Big Idea: I got more than what I came for.

John 4:4-17 (NIV)

⁴ Now he had to go through Samaria. ⁵ So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph. ⁶ Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired as he was from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about noon.

⁷ When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, "Will you give me a drink?" ⁸ (His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.)

⁹ The Samaritan woman said to him, "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?" (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

¹⁰ Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water."

¹¹ "Sir," the woman said, "you have nothing to draw with and the well is deep. Where can you get this living water?" ¹² Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us the well and drank from it himself, as did also his sons and his livestock?"

¹³ Jesus answered, “Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴ but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life.”

¹⁵ The woman said to him, “Sir, give me this water so that I won’t get thirsty and have to keep coming here to draw water.”

¹⁶ He told her, “Go, call your husband and come back.”

¹⁷ “I have no husband,” she replied.

GROUPS QUESTIONS:

1. What stood out to you most in this week’s message, and why?
2. Jesus meets the Samaritan woman at an ordinary well. Where have you seen God show up in unexpected or ordinary places in your own life?
3. Read John 4:7–10. What do you notice about how Jesus initiates the conversation? What might this teach us about how God often approaches us?
4. The woman goes to the well expecting water but leaves with something far greater. When have you experienced God giving you “more than what you came for”?
5. In verse 14, Jesus describes the living water as something that satisfies at a deeper level. What are some things we often look to for satisfaction that never fully quench our thirst?

6. Jesus gently brings the woman's truth to the surface (v. 16–17). Why do you think honesty and vulnerability are often part of receiving what God wants to give us?
7. What habits or structures in your life help you stay spiritually aligned so that God's work flows more freely through you?
8. The woman's encounter transformed her, and later in the chapter she brings others to Jesus. How does a genuine encounter with Jesus move us outward toward others?
9. Looking at your current season, where might Jesus be inviting you into deeper satisfaction, healing, or transformation—beyond what you originally came to Him for?
